Some ideas to consider are:

Give them the gift of an **experience** that they will have for a lifetime. Get them concert, sporting events, movie or theater tickets. Or take them to the local trampoline park, zip lining, kayaking, on a fishing charter or dolphin cruise, golfing, or bowling.

Annual passes can allow them many wonderful experiences throughout the year. We are fortunate to have some amazing places to visit and spend time within close proximity to our area. Consider an annual pass to places such as Oatland Island Wildlife Center, Fort Pulaski, the Coastal Heritage Society, or Skidaway State Park/ GA State Park annual pass, or the Telfair Museum. If you're wondering what stormwater is exactly, it is a common term referring to rain that falls and flows over the ground during a storm. Stormwater flows directly off of roads, lawns, pavement, and other impervious surfaces sometimes causing flooding, and eventually draining directly into nearby waterways. Stormwater should be clean and free of pollutants and sediments. However that is often not the case. As stormwater flows over surfaces, it collects and carries pollutants into nearby waterways. Some examples of pollutants include oil, fertilizer, trash, and pet waste.

Give them the gift of **knowledge**. There are classes for just about every hobby imaginable that could help them become better at something they enjoy. Depending on their interests classes for cooking, dance, swimming, music, pottery, painting/art, or photography would allow them to learn more about their interests. If you're lucky you may find yourself on the receiving end of some delicious goodies or beautiful artwork next year for the holidays!

Give them the gift of **goodies**. You can really get into the holiday season and make them something yourself such as yummy cookies and candies or homemade jams. If you don't have the time for homemade or you will need some cooking classes gifted to you before you can tackle that, you can give them a gift basket of fruit or wine or sign them up for the beer of the month club (there are snack of the month clubs for a nonalcoholic option). Gift cards to their favorite restaurant or coffee shop are a yummy gift as well.

Give them the gift of **entertainment**. Give them a couple months/year subscription to something they would enjoy. There are several book, music, and movie platforms out there that can allow them to have unlimited access to their favorite titles 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They will appreciate your thoughtfulness every time they jam out to their favorite songs or chill out watching a movie they have been wanting to see.

Give them the gift of **charity**...not them but to an organization or cause that they feel passionately about. Do you have an animal lover in your life? You can still be environmentally friendly in your purchases. Consider shopping locally for locally made products or buying second hand items. If your recipient isn't as environmentally friendly and may not be excited about an already used item, there are many companies that sell almost anything that you can think of made from recycled or sustainable materials. It might take a little research but you will feel better in the end that you are doing your part to reduce your impacts on the planet over the holidays.

Another way to reduce your impacts is to be eco-conscious in your wrapping of your gifts. Many places do not recycle wrapping paper so reducing and reusing are key in being eco conscious. You can reuse gift bags you received gifts in or put your gift in a cool tote bag instead of a gift bag. In lieu of wrapping paper you could wrap your present in cloth or in newspaper or other paper you already have on hand. Finally, if you have a live tree don't take it to the dump after the holidays where it will take up precious landfill space. Recycle it so that it can be turned into mulch! If you live in the County, they will pickup your trees curbside. And anyone can take their tree to one of the County recycling centers around the County to be processed. The Savannah/ Hilton Head Island International Airport is once again sponsoring Bring One for the Chipper tree recycling event, as well. Starting December 26th Christmas trees can be taken to the airport's recycling lot off Aggett Drive to be chipped into mulch for use throughout the airport's property for beautification projects, soil erosion prevention, and water retention efforts. Remember to remove all your lights and decorations from the tree for a smooth recycling process!

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
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Forsyth Farmers' Market
