The Comprehensive Plan—*Plan 2040,* is meant to be a guide for growth, redevelopment, and preservation of the municipality. It reflects the community's values and goals, and lays out strategies to achieve them. The benefits of planning include maintaining and improving quality of life, protecting private property rights, establishing a community vision, and providing more certainty about where development will occur, what it will look like, and when it will happen.

The MPC is responsible for updating the Comprehensive plans for Chatham County –Savannah. Garden City and Pooler has engaged MPC to update their Comprehensive Planning document. As a part of this process, your input to help guide the rewrite of the comprehensive plans is very important. The following outdoor watering schedules apply for all of Chatham County:

- The use of outdoor water is not allowed between **10:00 AM to 4:00 PM**;
- No watering is allowed on Fridays;

The City of Savannah is excited to kick off public engagement for the 100% Savannah Renewable Energy Plan!

In March of 2020 the Savannah City Council took a major first step in addressing the issue of climate change in our region by unanimously adopting a resolution committing that 100% of electricity consumed in the City of Savannah be generated from safe, clean and renewable energy by 2035, and all other energy needs to be generated from safe, clean, and renewable energy by 2050. The resolution committed the City to developing a clean-energy action plan- the 100% Renewable Energy Plan.

MPC AWARDED GRANT Coastal Empire Resilience Network

The Georgia Department of Natural Resources Coastal Resources Division (GADNR CRD) has announced that the MPC has been awarded a grant to aid in the formation of the Coastal Empire Resilience Network (CERN) that will ultimately benefit local jurisdictions within the coastal empire by actively improving the resilience of the area.

This project is meant to engage regional community partners, municipal staff, and policy-makers to share resources and coordinate strategies to address the physical, economic, and social challenges the Chatham County region faces due to climate change.

Additionally, the proposed project will strengthen the ability of the region to be more resilient, allowing the community to prepare, adapt, and respond to both short-term and long-term complex climate and weather-related challenges.

Grease Disposal

As you prepare to cook your holiday meals, remember don't pour grease of any kind down drains or into stormwater inlets. While grease or cooking oil may be liquid at first, it quickly hardens in pipes. Pour enough, and it will completely block the sewer pipe. Backups can fill your home with raw sewage, pollute nearby waterways, or cause a mess on your neighbor's property, and may require costly repairs.

Place kitchen grease in a container and put it in the trash. Or better yet, put it in a sealable container and when the container is full, recycle it with the City of Savannah. The City works with a local company to convert grease into environmentally friendly bio-fuel. Yellow (kitchen) grease is accepted free of charge at the City of Savannah's President Street Water Reclamation facility.



Sea Level Rise Impacts on Stormwater Systems in Chatham County

Chatham County recently completed a study of the impacts of sea level rise on the drainage system in the County and the City of Savannah. The study was funded under a grant award to the Georgia Department of Natural Resources from the Office for Coastal Management, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Some of the goals of the project were to assess impacts of sea level rise on stormwater infrastructure and critical facilities, identify potential best management practices to address vulnerable drainage systems, and update drainage the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) based on the results from the study.

The results of the study found that up to 3% of inland stormwater drainage structures in Unincorporated Chatham County are currently vulnerable to daily tidal inundation, while 8% are currently vulnerable to inundation at least once a

year during the year's highest annual tide (HAT). Results for the City of Savannah found that approximately 0.3% of stormwater inlets are vulnerable to daily tidal inundation, with 1% vulnerable at least once a year during the year's HAT.

Phase 2 of the project, which includes a sea level rise impact analysis for roads, a Green Infrastructure Plan for mitigating flooding from extreme high tide, and a tide gate best management plan manual, has been funded as well.




Forsyth Farmers' Market
