

Statement of Reason-Community Contribution

"If history is biography, then the history of the Civil Rights Movement in my home town of Savannah, Georgia is the biography of Rev. Matthew Southall Brown, Sr.." Former Congressman John Barrow

The life of Rev. Matthew Southall Brown, Sr. is exemplified in the quotes printed above and the enormous outpouring of testimonies from people of all walks of life, races and nationalities, who shared similar comments of his inspiration. He was lovingly known as Pastor Brown by his congregation at St. John Baptist Church. He became known as the "Pastors' Pastor," Dean of Pastors and as the "Prolific Preacher." To us he was more than a father, he was Daddy/Dad and to our mother, he was "Mack."

Rev. Brown was born and educated in Savannah, Georgia. His parents Mr. Christopher and Mrs. Helen R. Brown owned a duplex at 519 and 521 Hartridge Street, where he and his sibling played and spent their youth. No one could have foretold that by divine inspiration, he would become Pastor of St. John (The Mighty Fortress) Missionary Baptist Church, located on Hartridge Street.

Daddy served the community through his ministry with love and concern for its citizens. He served with dignity, respect, demonstrating character and led many to follow Christ. His selfless dedication to others was the hallmark of his life.

He became friend, pastor, confidant and community leader while serving as Pastor of St. John. The Hartridge Street area was enhanced because of his keen insight and the work he did in the community.

Community Acquisitions and Properties:

- A facility for the elderly and handicapped "The St. John Villa," developed under his leadership in collaboration with the Housing and Development Corporation of Savannah, in 1986.
- The "Matthew Southall Brown, Sr. Learning and Resource Center," completed in 1988.
- The "Matthew Southall Brown, Sr. Education Center" evolved from the purchase of two vacant existing houses, located next door to the church. The Education, Learning and Resource Centers served as meeting and research spaces for the church and community.
- A computer Lab for the church and surrounding community was housed in one of the homes restored by the church on Hartridge Street. All
 age groups were served.

When the church was destroyed by fire In 1993, dad did not leave the community in blight. He, with the congregation continued momentum, growth and outreach. His mantra "We Will Rebuild," energized the members of St. John, the community and supporters across the United States.

Dad's heart for servant leadership extended beyond the walls of the church.

 Initiative.
- Served as Chaplain of the Savannah Police Department later becoming Chief Chaplain with the rank of Captain.
- Traveled to Israel, having been selected by the Jewish Council of Savannah.
- Supported the inspiration of the Martins, St. John members who provided meals for the homeless and hungry with the Inner City Night Shelter.
- Saw to the needs of people across the Savannah community who experienced tragedies and life circumstances beyond their control..
- Lead the congregation to be involved in a wide range of charitable projects and contributions.
- Donated a substantial contribution to Savannah State University to provide financial support to students enrolled in a degree program.
- · Community Mediator in times of discord.

Requirements for Honorary Street Naming Designations. (Sec.4-1104)

Purpose

✓ Honorary street name designations are intended to recognize individuals who have made significant contributions to the City. The designation will be a temporary assignment of the honorarium and shall not interfere with the official name of the street.

Restrictions

- ✓ Roadways under the control of the Federal Highway Administration, Georgia Department of Transportation or Chatham County are not subject to honorary naming.
- ✓ Honorary designations shall be limited to one approved designation per City Council member per calendar year.
- ✓ Individual family tributes, commercially concerned and corporate-related recognitions shall not be eligible for honorary designation.

Requirements

- ✓ The proposed namesake made a sustained contribution over an appreciable time period, exerted efforts of benefit or significance to local, state or national affairs and/or demonstrated leadership in governmental, cultural or historical affairs, humanitarian efforts, or community development;
- ✓ The proposed namesake made contributions that beneficially changed the nature and characteristics of the community;
- ✓ The proposed namesake resided in the City for at least 5 years.
- ✓ A statement of reasons supporting the honorary naming request, including a discussion of the historical significance, contributions, heroic service or personal sacrifice by the honoree to the City, state or nation;
- ✓ Identification of the particular section or block of an existing City street for which the honorary designation is sought.
- ✓ A supporting petition signed by not less than 51 percent of all property owners abutting the subject right-of-way
- ✓ An endorsement by the current Mayor, an at-large alderman or the alderman representing the district in which the property is located.
- ✓ A check for \$150 made to the City of Savannah

Dad had many civic involvements, outreach ministries, official posts, and organizational affiliations. He breathed new life through his altruistic outreach and support of many. He enhanced the dignity and honor of Savannah "The Hostess City," when he was invited to serve as Guest Chaplain for the U.S. House of Representatives. He brought National and International recognition to Savannah when he was honored in Belgium and the Netherlands as a "Black Liberator," due to heroic efforts during World War II. He fought in the Battle of the Bulge.
